The elementary vocal music program is taught by 23 music teachers who visit each classroom for half-an-hour, twice a week. Vocal music performance is determined by desire and is practiced during the school day. Each of the 17 elementary schools has a fifth and sixth grade band which meets one full day a week, alternating sectionals and full rehearsals. An orchestra director is assigned halfday at each school for class lessons. Students are released from class for a halfhour lesson and 45-minutes for full rehearsals.

All four junior high schools have a seventh grade orchestra, a combined eighth and ninth grade orchestra, four choirs, and two bands at each grade level. Some of the groups are separated by ability. They have three 45-minute rehearsals and 24minute sectionals weekly for all music groups. General music is required as an academic subject for all seventh graders.

The three senior high schools each have three performing bands grouped by ability, an orchestra, three or four choirs, madrigal singers, stage band, and other ensemble groups. Each school also offers music theory and music appreciation as an academic subject. All performing groups rehearse three to five times a week, in addition to a 20-minute sectional lesson.

Edstrom has taught 10 years at senior high schools in his 17-year career, including band at all levels, junior and senior high school vocal music, general music, and senior high school theory. He also taught for three years at the University of Minnesota's High School Musicians Project.
